Every four years, a clergy person in the MN Annual Conference has the opportunity to take an extended study leave from the church ministry. Monies are provided from the Conference to help pay for some of the costs of this study leave. As I did with the Oaxaca trip four years ago, which I think you will agree was good for all of us, I will be taking some time away in January to learn something new.

This time I am doing it on a cruise ship in the middle of the western Caribbean. I'll be studying with The Rev. Dr. Wil Gafney and about 60 other clergy women from around the world. We will be discussing together the ways we can read scripture from the vantage point of women of color and those whose stories are often unheard and unappreciated. I think it will be an experience that will challenge, enlighten, and delight me. If you are interested in my schedule it is posted outside the office.

I will also be doing some relaxing, eating, swimming, snorkeling and birding!!! I will be participating in a snorkeling adventure led by a woman in Isla Roaten, an island off the coast of Honduras, who will also feed us a locally prepared meal.

Curiously, while a cruise ship sounds like a luxurious way to 'go', it is actually cheaper than booking a similar seminar on land! Someone has said that it is actually a cheaper way to do senior adult care than a care center...So, from January 4-15, I will be away from the January weather basking in sun and sea and learning deeply of new ways of exploring scripture and human history. I hope to bring back some great insights and a renewed sense of scriptural focus as we enter into a new time of ministry together.

While I am away, Rev's. Heather Klausen and David Stoeger will be the on-call pastors; if a need arises for something other than visits or prayer. I know that you all are very good at visiting the sick and elderly and praying for each other. They will be available for funerals or life-threatening concerns. Their numbers are posted in the office.

During the Sundays in January we will be exploring at a video series during worship: Rev. Adam Hamilton's "Seeing Gray in a World of Black and White" will be part of the worship services in place of the sermon. Each week a new video will be shown and discussion questions will be in the bulletin for you to ponder on your own or in a group. Here is some information about the video series:

Everyone agrees that America is polarized, with ever-hardening positions held by people less and less willing to listen to one another. No one agrees on what to do about it.

One solution that hasn't yet been tried, says Adam Hamilton, is for thinking persons of faith to model for the rest of the country a richer, more thoughtful conversation on the political, moral, and religious issues that divide us. Hamilton rejects the easy assumptions and sloppy analysis of black and white thinking, seeking instead the truth that resides on all sides of the issues, and offering a faithful and compassionate way forward.

He writes, "I don't expect you to agree with everything I've written. I expect that in the future even I won't agree with everything I've written here. The point is not to get you to agree with me, but to encourage you to think about what you believe. In the end, I will be inviting those of you who find this book resonates with what you feel is true, to join the movement to pursue a middle way between the left and the right - to make your voices heard - and to model for our nation and for the church, how we can listen, learn, see truth as multi-sided, and love those with whom we disagree."

Please come to worship with an open heart to hear what Spirit might have to say to you. I look forward to sharing these insights with you all during January.
