It isn't really about Jesus. Well, it is, but it isn't.

All throughout his life, Jesus kept pointing back to God, letting us know that this wasn't about him, it was all about God: Jesus' Abba, Holy Parent, Father. When Jesus says, "I am the way, the truth and the life, no one comes to God except through me." This was not about an exclusive way to salvation, it was about how to see God. We might see God in other things or even other people, but Jesus is the one who shows us what God is really like. Jesus was showing us through his life a deeper and fuller way of knowing and relating to God. As we approach the season of the death and resurrection of Jesus, it is good to keep in mind, it wasn't ever about Jesus, it is all about God and our relationship to God.

By the time Jesus showed up on the earth, people's concepts of God were pretty distorted. God was a vindictive, rule loving, bringer of punitive punishment. Only those who kept the religious laws of proper sacrifice, proper feast keeping, proper separation from the 'unclean' were considered people in God's favor. This was not only true of Jews but also of the Greeks and Romans. God or 'the gods' were something to be feared and only those who had the means (i.e. time, money, family connections) to properly reverence god were considered godly, good...everyone else was just getting by.

What Jesus wanted most was that all of humanity would be one with God. What Jesus wanted most was that, as people followed his example of living they would discover that they were living exactly as God wanted humans to live on the earth.

So, Jesus lived his life as one who wasn't bound by the rules humans had made, either religious or civic. He ate with sinners, did work on the Sabbath, touched the unclean, loved the unloved. The religious made rules against them because they said God hated the unclean, the unloved, the sinner and those who don't keep the Sabbath. He told civic authorities to care for the poor and widows and children, to feed them, provide shelter for them, to give away their coats and share their bread with them. He told everyone to welcome the stranger. All of which challenged the economic structure of the Greek/Roman society which rewarded the wealthy and powerful.

Jesus lived his life in the way God really wanted us to live. The way God really approved. The way God really expected those who say they are God's children to live.

And Jesus died, was put to death, murdered actually, by those who upheld the religious purity laws and those who enforced the unjust civic laws. And both groups of people thought they were doing the right thing. They thought they were upholding the laws of God and the laws of the state. They thought they were protecting the everyday people of their world from harm. They thought they were doing the right thing.

The authorities thought they were protecting people like us from harm by putting Jesus to death. They thought they were protecting us from a punitive God who would punish us for living and loving as Jesus taught us to live. It is breathtaking to think about, isn't it? That they could be so misguided that they would put an innocent man to death?

It is breathtaking and it is heart breaking, because today we see the same thing being played out on our own stage in our own religious and civic arenas.

We still have been taught by religious and civic authorities that God is a punitive God. That God hates people. That God will punish people for not following the rules.

We still get it wrong. Anytime we pass a law that takes food away from children, anytime we deny someone access to healthcare, anytime we say God hates ANYONE, we are killing Jesus again. Until we see the God Jesus showed us, we will always get it wrong and we will keep on murdering Jesus.

What we celebrate on Easter Sunday is that God, through the rebirth of God's son, makes it very clear to us that any religious laws and civic laws that make it lawful to discriminate against any of God's people are dead wrong. And as Christians we must do all we can to put to death those laws so that the only law that lives in the land is the law of Love. Love for God and love for neighbor.

That is why Jesus came.

To show us a true picture of God.
