I'm working on VBS this week. I get to teach the older kids this year; the 4-6th graders. Our theme is "To Mars and Beyond: Explore Where God's Power Can Take You." I've been collecting 'props' for my teaching room. Things like Lava Lamps, Moon silhouettes, Star lights, Rocket ships and Circuit Boards. We will be doing science experiments and experiential experiences while we learn Bible stories.

I'll be using the stories I will be teaching in VBS as the basis for some of my sermons in June. These are some of the old stories we have always taught in VBS, Daniel in the Lion's Den, Queen Esther, The Ten Lepers, and The Good Samaritan. It is always good to gather in the beginning of summer to teach these old, old stories to our next generation of church leaders. These stories are where many of us began our faith journey. Learning about how God 'shut up the mouths of the lions' and convinced a king that God was the one really in power. Learning about Queen Esther, who also defined the ways of the court to save her people from extinction. Remember the Ten Lepers who were all healed by Jesus but only one came back to say thank you? And, of course, the Good Samaritan, the unlikely hero who cares for his enemy, the story on which so many hero stories are based.

These stories helped us learn that God's power can take us "Beyond." Beyond our fears, our prejudice, our preconceived notions, our diseases, our circumstances. We need these stories now, don't we? It is no secret that we, daily, need to look beyond our fears and the hate-filled language that permeates all aspects of our media. We need to remember that thousands of years ago, the Daniel's and Esther's and Good Samaritan's had to stand up to hate-filled language and do the work of God in the world. It is good to remember that not everyone says "thank you" even after getting a great gift like healing. But when we do turn around to say "thank you" we might experience an even greater gift than we anticipated.

These stories continue to help us learn that God's power can take us "Beyond".

Will people know, through your actions, words and attitudes, that God's power takes you beyond that pettiness and even hate-filled rhetoric that is so common? Will you experience God's gifts more than you can ever imagine because you have remembered to wake up each day saying thank you?

This summer there will be many opportunities for us to go 'beyond' as we interact with family, friends, and neighbors. May people experience God's power through our humble obedience to the teaching we learned in the old, old Biblical stories.

Our Lenten Offering Dollars at Work:

50 Minnesota United Methodist Churches Contributed To Build The Rev. Richard Ormsby Secondary School In Baiwalla, Sierra Leone

Through OC Ministries, 50 Minnesota United Methodist churches contributed to an effort to build The Rev. Richard Ormsby Secondary School in Baiwalla, Sierra Leone, which will open its doors in September. Their contributions helped to heal a broken world in a tangible way and extend God's love to children in another part of the world. Rev. Judith Banya—an elder in the Minnesota Conference who returned home to Sierra Leone after serving two Minnesota churches—has been instrumental in planning for the school. It is named after Rev. Richard Ormsby, a retired Minnesota elder who served as her mentor and helped her through the process of becoming a pastor. This is the eighth school that OC Ministries has funded and built in partnership with Minnesota churches.

Minnesota United Methodists have been steadily contributing money and volunteer time to construct the new secondary school, which will provide an opportunity for 800 children to graduate from high school. This school is located in a remote area of Sierra Leone where people live on \$1 per day, and where few children have had the opportunity to obtain a high school education. Students at the school will receive two meals a day through a partnership with local nonprofit Feed My Starving Children, and more than 120 students have already received scholarships to attend the school. The whole region is celebrating and anticipating the opening of this new school as it will give the graduates a chance to have a more prosperous life than their parents have had.

And what a beautiful school facility it is! It's a U-shaped, two story facility containing 14 classrooms, a library, an auditorium, a teachers' work room, and administrator offices. Constructed of concrete, the school has white stucco and tile throughout. A covered walkway connects all the classrooms on one level with each other. Near the school site, Pastor Banya has acquired 40 acres of land that will be used for farming crops and animals; the goal is for the school to be self-sustaining in five years.

The new principal A.V. Fomba will become the first principal of the new school. He has been a certified English teacher for 15 years and possesses bachelor's degree, with distinction, from the University of Sierra Leone, Freetown, as well as a diploma in social work and human resource management. He grew up in the Baiwalla area so is happy to come "home" to serve his people. Fomba is married with three adult biological children, but has raised additional children whose parents died or were not capable of raising them.

A mission team of five from Hennepin Avenue UMC traveled to Baiwalla in March to work with Banya to do administrative work required to get the school open in September. Fomba, who is now a teacher in Freetown, Sierra Leone, joined the mission team and Banya for a series of meetings with both church and state officials to negotiate the opening of the school. They also had lots of time to discuss the philosophy and operations of the school.

Banya, Fomba, and the mission team decided that the school will be designed as a "model school," one that uses the best teaching methods available in Sierra Leone. Fomba's vision for the school involves hiring college-educated, certified teachers; discipline without corporal punishment; the establishment of a computer lab and training for faculty and students; and hands-on scientific experimentation for the science curriculum. "I want to design a 'model school' in a rural area because kids in rural areas often don't have qualified teachers because qualified teachers don't often want to live in rural areas," said Fomba. "I want to make this school so appealing that qualified teachers will want to teach here."

Fomba is already working on developing the new school. One of the mission team members pledged to pay his salary for the first year. Other members of the team bought him a motorcycle to get around the country, and he was given a smart phone and a computer to help him try to line up funding sources.

Seasons at Home: Reflections on the Sunday Lectionary Texts

June 2, 2019—Acts 16:16-34

The jailer called for a light, then rushed in and fell trembling at the feet of Paul and Silas, and, after a brief interval, led them out and asked them, "What must I do to be saved?"

Unexpected ministry arises when the gospel brings its followers into conflict with economic and judicial systems. Enacting the gospel's liberation can be costly. Think of stories of people you know who show courage in their faithful living.

Prayer O God, we are thankful for the songs and stories of faith that fill us with courage. We pray for those who suffer when they follow in your way. Amen.

For the next 4 Sundays we will use the VBS stories as the basis for our Sunday worship texts

June 9—Pentecost Sunday—Daniel 9

God delivers and rescues! God works signs and wonders in heaven and earth, for God has saved Daniel from the power of the lions! (Daniel 6:27)

People around the world face challenges to their faith every day—some small, some significant, and even some life-threatening. In our Bible story, we explore and observe the example Daniel provides of faithfulness in the midst of such a challenge. While Daniel's story had a happy ending, we do not put our faith in specific outcomes; instead, we have faith that no matter what happens, God is with us and will help us in amazing ways. *Prayer: God, can we ever be like Daniel? Do you expect us to? What do you want us to do and be in this, our, time and place in history?*

June 16—Esther

God put you here for a moment just like this. (Esther 4:14)

However much we may wish it to be otherwise, prejudice and hatred are still very much alive in our world, our headlines, and even our own communities. Queen Esther provides an example of boldly standing up for her people. Her perseverance in the face of fear and resistance inspires us to believe that, because of our faith, we can use our positions, influence, and resources to stand up for others.

Prayer: What have you put me here for at this moment, God? What do I need to do that might need done?

June 23—The Good Samaritan—Luke 10:25-37

Love the Lord your God with all your heart and all your soul and all your strength and all you mind, and love your neighbor as yourself. (Luke 10:27)

In our Bible story, we explore and observe the example the Good Samaritan provides of true kindness in the form of caring action for others across cultural boundaries. His compassionate and sacrificial loving care show us that, because of our faith, we can show God's love and kindness through our actions. *Prayer: Where and when, God, should I be more than kind?*

June 30—The Ten Lepers—Luke 17:11-19

One of them, realizing what had happened, came back praising God in a loud voice, then fell down at the feet of Jesus and spoke his praises.

Giving thanks is important in the Bible, occurring over 120 times in Scriptures! In our Bible story, we explore and observe the example a Samaritan provides by showing thanks for the blessing he received before enjoying its fruits. His gratitude and humility show us that, because of our faith, we can make a difference by showing thanks to those who care for us.

Prayer: Help me to be the one who turns around to say thank you. Amen

July 7 – Unexpected Prophets 2 Kings 5:1–14

Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than any of the waters of Israel? Couldn't I wash in them and be cleansed?

Something to think about

Simple things sometimes produce extraordinary results. God and Jesus both use ordinary people to spread the good news and to let our story of faith unfold in simple ways. Recall times that started out ordinary then ended up being extraordinary.

Prayer

God, you speak to us in surprising ways, through unexpected people. May we be your love to others through small and simple actions. Amen.

July 14 – Deep Down Questions--1 Kings 19:1–4, (5–7), 8–15a

Full of fear, Elijah fled for his life.

Something to think about

Elijah was scared and hid in a cave and waited, hoping to hear God. Elijah listened for God in the roar and chaos but did not hear God. Then there was a silence, a stillness, and Elijah heard God in the stillness. Elijah heard God in the silence. Like Elijah, sometimes we have to be still and look deep down to discover that God is with us.

Prayer Thank you, God, for being with us all the time, especially when we are worn out. In moments of stillness, may we feel you near us giving us the strength that we need. Amen.

July 21 – Faithful Listeners--Luke 10:38–42

You're anxious and upset about so many things, but only a few things are necessary—really only one **Something to think about**

Jesus enables Martha to see the value in what Mary is doing. We can be disciples by both learning and serving. God desires that we do both. Jesus thinks it is important that we listen and learn.

Prayer

God of wisdom, sometimes it can be hard to know when we should be up and serving others and when we should sit still and listen to you. Help us to choose the better thing at the right time. Amen.

July 28 – Prayerful Disciples--Luke 11:1–13

One day Jesus was praying, and when he had finished, one of the disciples asked, "Rabbi, teach us to pray **Something to think about**

Jesus wants us to feel connected to God. God wants that, too. Jesus

teaches the disciples - and us - how to pray. A prayer can be words, actions, singing, or even silence. When we are beginning to learn about prayer, sometimes it is easier to say words taught to us instead of trying to find our own words.

Prayer

Loving God, we thank you that you love us and are always ready to hear our prayers. Help us to keep on praying and never give up. Amen.
