As we enter the time of Lent we are once again thinking about all the ways we can be aware of God's work in our everyday life.

On the first Sunday of Lent we will acknowledge both our humanity and our unique call to be as humanely and humanly as possible, people of God. We will dip our fingers in the waters of baptism reminding ourselves that we are children of God and then receive ashes to remind ourselves that children of God are fragile beings, subject to temptation and sin and being led astray.

With this introduction to the realities of our lives, we will continue our journey through Lent thinking together about what it means to be a following of Jesus in a world that is permeated by media, technology, and global economies.

I believe that there is a spirituality in all things, even in our 21<sup>st</sup> century life that seems so full of non-spiritually minded distractions. And I think that one of the reasons we find ourselves so disassociated with the spirituality of the 21<sup>st</sup> century is because we have been led to believe it is all so evil.

Remember, when the church thought dancing was evil? Card playing? Working on Sunday? Remember the movie "Footloose"? That movie was based on actual events. Just as in the movie, the church I attended as a teenager and young adult, did not allow going to movies, dancing or playing regular cards. I will never forget sneaking into Dr. Zhivago with my best friend in high school. I could hardly enjoy the movie because I was afraid someone might find out I had attended it. While we now might think these attitudes are ridiculous, I think some of the attitudes we have about computers, media, and technology are the same as the attitudes some people had about dancing, cards and movies in the 60's. Each generation creates their own 'evil list'.

But we should have learned by now that naming benign things as evil does not help us grow as Christians.

What helps us grow as Christians is learning how to see the beauty and spirituality of life that is possible when we think carefully about how we engage with culture.

A story that inspires these thoughts:

I was in a shop one day looking at lovely items from all around the world. My eyes were drawn to a little doll, dressed in African cloth, a beaded necklace adorning her neck, holding a bowl made from a gourd embellished with small shells; I could tell someone put a lot of love and care in making this little wired dolly. I was immediately in love. But what really sold me on this dolly was the reason she had been so lovingly crafted.

Girls in Mali, Africa, one of the poorest countries in the WORLD, wanted to purchase computers for their school. GIRLS in Mali, Africa, a place where girls typically don't go to school past elementary school, if even that.

Girls in Mali, Africa crafted these dolls to raise money for computers so that their education could be comparable to other developed countries. Girls, in Mali, Africa who were more often than not, married off to men while they were in their teens, had the vision and drive to improve their lives! In ways most of us would never imagine.

THAT is what always, always inspires me. Anyone who has the imagination to see beyond what others see in possible.

These girls continue to inspire me.

Every time I look at my little dolly, because of course, I purchased her, I wonder, did they get their computers? What are they doing now? And, more importantly, how can I live in such a courageous way that defies other people's expectations of what I can do? May we all be courageous as we imagine ways we can partner with each other in doing the work of the gospel.

## Living the Seasons at Home—March

### **March 3--Luke 9:28–36**

*While Peter was speaking, a cloud came and overshadowed them, and the disciples grew fearful as the others entered it. Then from the cloud came a voice which said, "This is my Own, my Chosen One. Listen to him!"*

#### **Something to think about, talk about or do**

If only faith were like this every day! If only we could sit in the presence of Jesus and other great people of faith, and bask in the mystery and glory of God. But we're about to move into the Season of Lent, preparing for Easter. This is a time when we prepare for the very unexpected nature of God's greatness. We cannot stay on a mountain forever, but the mountain gives us the hope to go on.

**Prayer:** *God, give me eyes to see your glory and courage to take that glory into the highways and byways of my life.*

### **March 10 --Psalm 51: 1-17**

*O God, have mercy on me! Because of your love and your great compassion, wipe away my faults; wash me clean of my guilt; purify me of my sin. For I am aware of my faults, and have my sin constantly in mind.*

#### **Something to think about, talk about or do**

As Lent begins, we remember that all we have comes from God. We recognize that although we have been created in wholeness and balance by God's grace and wisdom, that same wisdom created us with volition and choice, frailty and vulnerability. And because of these things, we do not live in perpetual bliss, but we live in the balance that includes failure, pain, injury, and the sins of separation from God, and from one another.

#### **Something to think about, talk about or do**

Light a candle and think about how God has blessed you. What stories about God and God's love will you remember and pass on?

**Prayer:** *As I begin to observe a holy Lent, make me aware of not only my sins, brokenness and shortcomings, but also the Grace, you my Savior, extend to me every moment of every day.*

### **March 17 – Luke 13:31-35**

*"How often I have wanted to gather your people just as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings"*

#### **Something to think about, talk about or do**

Why do you think an image of a mother hen came to Jesus when he was concerned for Jerusalem? What images of God could help you feel loved by God?

**Prayer:** *Loving God, as we face all of our trials and tribulations, help us to remember that you long to gather us under the protection of your wings.*

### **March 24--Isaiah 55:1–9**

*Why spend your money for what is not bread, your wages for what fails to satisfy?*

#### **Something to think about, talk about or do**

Sometimes, we invest too much of our energy and money in things that don't last, like material objects. Sometimes, we worry we will be excluded from community because we don't have the money or the talents of others. But the prophet Isaiah has a message for the people: God loves all. The prophet encourages us to seek after God and God's ways above all. God gives something to all who seek – steadfast love.

**Prayer:** *God, our loving and constant love, help us to rest in Your love so that we can know what is important in life. So that we can celebrate all that is good and worthwhile as a gift from You.*

### **March 31— Luke 15:1–3, 11b–32**

*"This person welcomes sinners and eats with them!"*

#### **Something to think about, talk about or do**

This is a story about finding a home and knowing where we belong. We're all different. Some of us know where our home is all the time, others have to leave home to discover where they belong. This is also a story that often touches hidden sadnesses in our lives – for those of us who never left home in the first place, so never had a party in our honor; for those of us who wait for people we love to come home; for those who have returned home to no welcome; and for those who have been forced to leave home but never wanted to. God's love is like no human love – it is limitless, boundless, and weeps for all.

**Prayer:** *Loving Parent God, thank you for always welcoming us home. Help us remember those whose homes are not stable and not as secure. Help us help others to find their way home.*

There is a school in Baiwalla, Sierra Leon called the Rick Ormsby Secondary School, pictured above, which is supported by OC Ministries\* and led by a pastor from Minnesota, the Rev. Judith Banya. Judith returned to her home of Sierra Leon to help set up United Methodist ministries in churches and schools in a country recovering from civil war. Currently, she has to drive one hour to get internet

services. She is on the cusp of opening a secondary school building which will include internet and computer access for students and staff.

While we don't know what happened to the computer project in Mali (see the pastor's article), we have the opportunity to do something tangible for a school in Sierra Leon that is also visioning and imagining the possibilities of computers for their school so that girls and boys can be better prepared for the world.

Our Lenten special offering this year will go to Computers for Baiwalla AND, because we too, are on the cusp of something new, the development of a new website for our church.

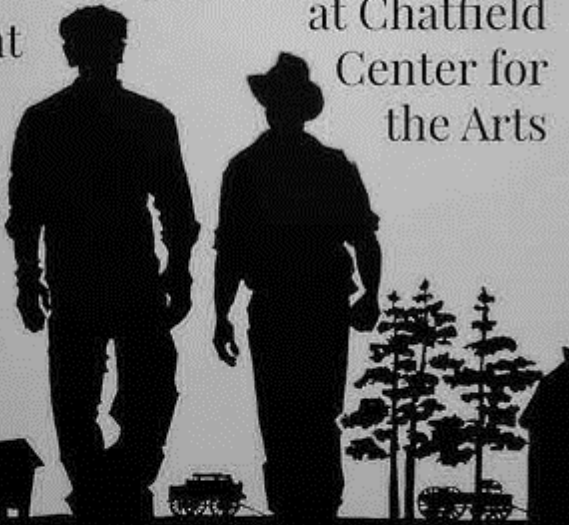
