Do you know that we are the oldest church in town? The first Methodist clergy was appointed to Chatfield in 1855, one year after the town was established. In 1859, the first church building was constructed. Chatfield UMC and Chatfield, the town, have grown up alongside each other. The church and the town have, together, seen the ups and downs of being a community.

Do you know that we are known as a very welcoming and hospitable church? That people see us as a place to go to when they have a need or a concern? Someone just posted on Google maps that Chatfield UMC was the place to go for people in need. They wrote: "Great resource for families in need." And we are not just here for food gas cards, and medical equipment, although those are huge sources of help. I get called on, often, by people who just want to know where to go to find one service or another. Who just need prayer or pastoral care. It is a privilege to be able to serve a church with such open doors.

Through a grant, we have been able to advertise our church's unique way of being in the community of Chatfield. Through the newspaper, play bills, tourist publications, school year book we let others know that we are a church that prides ourselves in our involvement in the community of Chatfield. Our tag line for those ads are: "Serving the Community for over 150 years."

With the decision at Annual Conference this summer, we can, with pride and assurance, put out the welcome mat for all. ALL. We affirmed together in June, that as UM's in MN we will put no barriers in the way of anyone who wants to be a full part of the UMC in Minnesota, not only church membership but also ordination and any position to which one is called and qualified. This thrills my heart. While I have always been open and affirming of all God's children and extend my ministry to all; I have been careful not to put the church I serve at risk. Now, I can minister fully and we as a church can be free to minister fully to whomever God sends our way.

Which brings me to the signs. These came from a grant and they aren't doing what they were intended to do unless people put them in their yards. That is what we want. A sign in every yard. A sign of welcome. A sign of solidarity. A sign of love. That is what a rainbow represents, the heart of God. When Noah left the ark, God placed a rainbow in the sky to remind us: every time we see a rainbow; God will always love us NO MATTER WHAT! The rainbow is a sign of God's heart for all God's people.

As Christians, we affirm and claim God's love by sharing the sign of God's heart with our community.

If you haven't already, please take a sign. Put it in your yard, at least until the first freeze. Let's carpet our community with the sign of God's heart of welcome.

It is important. It is a privilege. It is about us. It is about our neighbor. It is about God's heart.

September 22 – Faith Persists

2 Timothy 3:14—4:5 All scripture is inspired of God, and is useful for teaching—for reprimanding, correcting, and training in justice— so that the people of God may be fully competent and equipped for every good work.

Something to think about, talk about or do

Timothy is encouraged to persist in proclaiming the good news.

Practice persistence as a household, discuss any situation that needs changing – a group of people in need of assistance or support, an environmental concern, a project at your church. What can you do to make a difference? The situation may seem great but look at small things that you can do. How can you be persistent in working for change, slowly but surely?

Service Trip To Louisiana

A Minnesota Conference trip to the UMCOR Sager Brown Depot in Baldwin, Louisiana is planned for Jan. 12-24, 2020. Join the group to help serve at this clearing house for UMCOR relief supplies. The trip is open to people age 18 and over.

You can select one week (Jan. 12-17 or Jan. 19-24) or both. Cost is \$250/week for housing and food. A \$50 deposit is due when you register. You'll need to find your own transportation to and from Baldwin.

Persons can pack and verify cleaning buckets and hygiene kits in the depot, work in the campus garden, or serve in the community at a thrift store, senior housing complex, or by doing minor home repair. Evening activities include a campfire, worship, and general relaxation. Nearby attractions are Avery Island, Cajun and Creole museums, the Whitney Plantation, and the WWII Museum (in New Orleans.)
