Choose to Wait—Choose a Better Way—Choose to Be Courageous—Choose to Trust

It is Advent! Time to start marking the days off until Christmas. Waiting for the Christ Child to be born among us anew. As Christians we mark this time as a time to **Choose to Wait**.

We try to slow everything down a bit and focus on the coming of Christ in our midst.

It is hard, but it is worth it. We **Choose a Better Way** so that we can be better people. People focused on the love of Christ. Sometimes this takes courage because so much of the world is focused on the glitter of the holiday but we **Choose to Be Courageous**. We take time to come to church, to tell the story in a different way. Because when it is all said and done, we can realize that this season calls us to something bigger and broader and higher and wider than all the glitter and festivities can fulfill. This season reminds us to **Choose to Trust**. Trust that this impossible story of a child born in a stable 2000 years ago can have anything to do with the rest of the year.

Here are some ideas for activities that you and your family could do this Advent season to remind yourselves that this waiting has a bigger purpose that what we normally sense. We are waiting and watching and working toward the coming of the Christ among us again.

What kind of story do your decorations tell? What do they tell others about what your family believes about Christmas? What are some ways you can change or add to your decorations to tell the story of God's vision for peace and your own hopes and prayers?

How can you make celebrations for family or friends who may find Christmas difficult? How can you be a friend for them at this time? How will the celebrations you are part of help to make Christmas better for others?

In the midst of a busy season, see if you can reclaim even one small part of Christmas. Sing a hymn or song each evening or light a candle together before a meal. You might play some beautiful Christmas music in the car when you are out and about preparing for Christmas.

Talk about how love has been part of the decisions you make as a family. When have you chosen love over common sense or love over other people's opinions? What symbols of love do you have around your home?

The little children of the church receive an Advent Calendar to help them mark off the days until Christmas. Maybe you would like to do that in your own home. These can be purchased at card shops and on line.

Stories for this Advent and Christmas

December 1- Choose to Wait

Isaiah 2:1–5 & Matthew 24:36-44 "No one knows that day and that hour—not the angels of heaven, nor even the Only Begotten—only Abba God."

Something to think about: Isaiah wrote what God's world of love would look like – and even gave us instructions on how to get there. Peace does not magically happen, it is brought to life when people live with faithfulness. God doesn't take away the weapons of destruction – God expects us to turn them into instruments of creation. God wants us to live in a way that brings hope to others. Imagine what a world without violence or war would look like. Now imagine what you can do to help create that. What everyday items in your household could be turned around and used to represent hope? For example, if your family fights over who has control of the TV remote control, you might tie a ribbon around it to remind you of your family's commitment to being people of love.

Prayer: God of Hope, thank you for sending Jesus. Help us to be hopeful people as we share with others. Amen.

December 8, 2019 - Choose a Better Way

Isaiah 11:1–10 There will be no harm, no destruction anywhere in my holy mountain; for as water fills the sea, so the land will be filled with knowledge of Yahweh.

Something to think about: The cow and bear, the lion and ox, living alongside each other in peace does not seem very likely, does it? Isaiah seems relentless though, in his belief that this kind of world is possible when people live with righteousness and faith. We might all wish and hope for the peace Isaiah promises, but the real challenge is not just to believe it will happen, but to live in a way that will bring this world to life. What is a symbol of peace in your household? Put it in a prominent place this week to remind you of the daily need to live for peace.

Prayer: God of Peace, thank you for sending Jesus. Help us live lives of peace with others. Amen.

<u>December 15, 2019 – Choose to Be Courageous</u>

Luke 1:47–55 "Mary said: "My soul proclaims your greatness, O God, and my spirit rejoices in you, my Savior." Something to think about: Like all mothers, Mary had high hopes for her baby. She wanted to tell others about this special child, and so she sang a song. She sang that this child would bring loving kindness to the world. Mary's baby would give good things to those in need and would turn the world upside down with God's love. Mary was filled with joy because she would give birth to this special child of God. What things bring joy to your household? Choose something that reminds you of joy. Place these somewhere close to your front door so that as you leave and enter your house, you are reminded of the joy that God gives.

Prayer: God of joy, thank you for sending Jesus. Help us discover your joy and share it with others. Amen.

<u>December 22, 2019 – Choose to Trust</u>

Matthew 1:18–25 "All this happened to fulfill what God has said through the prophet: "The young woman will be with child and give birth, and the child will be named Immanuel" —a name that means "God is with us."

Something to think about: On this last Sunday of the Advent season, we hear about love in all shapes, love that makes tough choices, love that trusts and believes, love that risks, love that lives. We know, through this story, that Jesus' willingness to step out courageously didn't come from nowhere. It was inherited from his parents. What legacy of love do you want to be passed down through your family?

Prayer: God of love, thank you for sending Jesus. Help us remember your love and share it with others. Amen.

December 29, 2019 - Choose Praise

Psalm 148 Praise God, all you angels; praise God, all you hosts! Praise God, sun and moon; praise God, all you shining stars!

Something to think about: The wind whistles and the trees shake their branches in the air. Humans sing, dogs wag their tails. Each element of nature applauds, in its own way. The Sacred Energy that created Earth keeps it going. During the Season of Christmas, there is much to celebrate. Let us sing joy to and with the whole world. **Prayer** Let the whole wide world give thanks to God!

General Conference 2020

Some have asked about the General Conference happening in Minneapolis in May of 2020. You will be hearing in the news and on line the potential for a church split and other words that are confusing and concerning. As with the

last General Conference in 2019, we will proceed as the UMC in Chatfield, doing what we have been called to do with the confidence that God who has begun a good work in and through us will carry it on to perfection in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 1:6)

Bishop Ough urges us to this task, also. Here are his words of call to mission from his latest letter to our Conference. "In June, at the Minnesota Annual Conference Session we adopted an aspirational vision that articulated a Methodism "rooted in Jesus, grounded in Wesleyan theology, inclusive of all persons, and engaged in the work of justice and reconciliation."

I believe that Jesus' three key missional imperatives we have been lifting up as our vision for every local congregation—grow in love of God and neighbor, reach new people, and heal a broken world—are most fully expressed as an inclusive church. I urge you to live into the vision we adopted as we continue to embrace our mission of making disciples of Jesus who are equipped and sent to make the kingdom visible and available to all God's people. Above all else, Jesus' ministry was to extend abundant life to all of God's beloved children. Jesus' ministry was for all and to all. God, in Christ, is constantly drawing the circle wider, constantly expanding the table of grace.

There is still much uncertainty about what will happen next May when General Conference meets. We don't yet know whether The United Methodist Church might provide space for the different ways we do ministry in our various contexts, or whether we will be part of a new expression of Methodism to be birthed. But we as the Minnesota Annual Conference have clarified our values, and I, as your bishop, am committed to those values and vow to lead us down whatever path blesses and enables us to be the church God is calling us to be."
