I wrote on Facebook the other day that I am getting tired of apologizing for my own denomination. This is in response to all the media attention we have been receiving nationally and locally. If you are feeling as if the institutional church which you have been a part of most of your life is frustrating and confounding, know that most of us who lead churches are feeling very much the same way. Even retired Bishops. I listened to a podcast featuring Bishop William Willimon who expressed his own dismay and frustration with the institutional church called UM. I think if a Retired Bishop from the south can feel exasperated, we can too. Bishop Willimon none the less had good things to say even in his frustration. He exhorted those of us in the local church to keep on doing the work of the local church, to do this in the best ways we know how, and to be faithful to the message of Jesus Christ who has taught us how to love. I also resonate with this quote from Renee Notkin from Union Church in Seattle, "Jesus' subversive challenges to the human-crafted structures that oppress and bind is what keeps me following Jesus and holding on to hope that there is a third way—the Jesus way that brings healing to individuals, communities, and nations."

I hope you have heard me say similar sentiments. It seems in this time, when we don't know the future of the denomination the best thing we can do it keep on being faithful to what Christ called the church to be, the embodiment of his message of grace and love and salvation in the world.

And that includes being as positive as possible about all that the church means in our community.

I know many of you read and heard the reports from the church in Cottage Grove. The news reports didn't get the whole picture and, yet, there is truth to some of what they reported. Know that my commitment has always been to an intergenerational church that works together in the ways we are able to do the work of Christ in the community and the world.

At the same time, I just want us to remember that anytime a church makes changes someone is going to be upset. Just think of the changes that have happened historically in <u>this</u> church that could have made for some stunningly bad headlines. Especially, if only one side of the story was told. Unfortunately, in this day and age,

these stories get picked up by media and spread around the world in the blink of an eye. I think we can all breathe a sigh of relief that our 'dirty laundry' wasn't hung out to dry before the world. LOL So once again, we, who are trying to do the work of Christ in our community, need to be people who positively speak about the work that God is doing among us. We need to keep on with our discipline we began in November of GOPA for God. We will continue to remind ourselves to have an attitude of Gratitude, Optimism, Positivity and Appreciate for all that God is doing in us, through us, and around us.



So we will continue to ask ourselves each Sunday during Prayers of the Church: Where have we seen God at work in our lives, our community and our world. I encourage you to make this a daily habit. For as the year progresses we will need to remember that this is the bottom line: God is at work in the world through us, in us, and around us. That is TRUTH and that is the TRUTH that MATTERS Hope and Peace, Pastor Debra

Matthew 5:13–20 In the same way, your light must shine before others so that they may see your good acts and give praise to your Abba God in heaven.

Something to think about, talk about, or do

You *are* the salt of the earth. You *are* the light of the world. We see this week that disciples of Jesus flavour and light up the world. We are created to be creative in how we share God's love with the world. In being salty and light, we are fulfilling the purpose of our creation.

Sing together the children's song "This Little Light of Mine" and light candles or flashlights.

Watch the patterns you create as you carry light to the world.

February 16, 2020 - Grow

Deuteronomy 30:15-20 *Choose life, then, so that you and your descendants may live, by loving Yahweh, your God, by obeying God's voice and by clinging to Yahweh.*

Something to think about, talk about, or do

Sometimes, the words we hear from God are hard. Sometimes, they are encouraging. Always, they are shared to help us live more fully into who we are created to be. This week's readings remind us that relationships are hard, but they are worth the work. Together, with one another, we all look and work toward the future of God's kin-dom on Earth. One person does one thing, another does another, a third builds upon both, and so forth...before we realize it, we are all living fully into our creation. **Play** the "Yes, And!" game from Drama Notebook (<u>https://www.dramanotebook.com/drama-games/yes-and/</u>) and discuss the questions offered on the website. **Listen** together to the song "This Is Me" by Keala Settle from *The Greatest Showman* soundtrack as a closing prayer, giving thanks to God for who you've been created to be!

The transfiguration story of Jesus reminds us that once we learn something new about someone, we can never see them the same way again. The same is for us. Once we realize that we are everything that God deemed good about creation, we cannot go back to the person we were before we gained that knowledge. We are changed people. The Transfiguration, in a nutshell, tells us that "we've seen it, so now it's time to move on." We are a sent people. We have purpose, and we are part of God's grand, cosmic, chaotic, elevated plans. **Share** your times you've seen Jesus or felt Jesus nearby.
